

Continued from front For the past four-and-a-half years, Scioto Countians heard Hapney report on the happenings of the area, as a news anchor for Classic Rock 107.5 The Breeze, Fox Sports 95.7 and 1260 WNXT, and Mix 99.3. He will continue in a limited news role on those stations, working Sunday-morning-news and weather duty, as well as cohosting "Gospel Jubilation" - a southern gospel music show on 95.7 and 1260 WNXT-with his 16-year-old son, Blake.

A tenured full professor in the W. Page Pitt School of Journalism and Mass Communications in the College of Arts and Media at Marshall University, Hapney teaches news writing and other journalism and public relations courses at both the undergraduate and graduate levels at MU. His scholarly, peer-reviewed research is published at the national and international levels. He worked for a variety of radio and television stations during his career, as well as newspapers and magazines-local, regional, and statewide. Hapney began his academic career in journalism in 1994 as a graduate assistant at Marshall University. From there he served as an adjunct professor teaching journalism, English, and advertising at SSU. Before accepting a job offer from Marshall University in 2008, Hapney's full-time faculty role at SSU was as a journalism, communication, and English professor. He spent 10 years as adviser to the student newspaper-The University Chronicle-there. During Hapney's 15 years with SSU, he worked for four university presidents, managing both the Office of the President and creating and managing the Office of Communications. 

Hapney, his wife Claudette, their biological sons Brock and Blake, and their adopted daughter (from China) Siyan reside on the banks of the Ohio River.

Hapney has had professional opportunities to move elsewhere in the United States; that said, he is happy to call this area "home."

"I love our area," Hapney said. "I'm thankful for the many years I've enjoyed here both personally and professionally, I look forward to a long, productive time in my new role with the Scioto Voice."
