There is some difference in this classification for the two years. In 1956 maitres

primaire and instituteurs elementaires are included; in 1958 only instituteurs with a diploma from the Ecole Mormale in Vientiane are listed.

Under this classification are student and probationary teachers (939 and 415 in 1956). 1958 there were 1,896 instauris or teachers with only primary education (6 years) and 28

ewho did not meet this requirement.

These are Buddhist monks who serve as elementary school teachers. Usually their secular

fraining is not very great.
French personnel limited to the colleges, Lycee, and technical training schools. In 195 there were 2,133 Lao teachers and 101 French; in 1958 the figures were 2,512 and 114 respectively.
