Drafted amicus briefs in cases of strategic importance to immigrants. *See, e.g., Bayo v. Napolitano*, 593 F.3d 495 (7th Cir. 2010) (en banc) (amicus brief setting out a position concerning the rights of entrants under the Visa Waiver Program that the Court largely adopted).
