

What is the Shenandoah Living Archive?

The Shenandoah Living Archive (SLA) is a Libraries and Educational Technologies initiative that engages students, the local community, and faculty in capturing, creating, and curating the real-time documentation of life in the Shenandoah Valley. During the Fall 2015 semester, JMU Professor Sean McCarthy's WRTC Digital Rhetoric class took on the exciting task of prototyping the Shenandoah Living Archive concept. Students used born-digital items (oral histories, images, video, geospatial data) and physical materials (flyers, pamphlets, diaries) along with modern technologies to remix and enhance archival resources.



The Living Archive concept anchors archival practice in undergraduate community engagement and research; it gives students the autonomy to harness technology in creative ways to discover vibrant methods of connecting with the cultures and environment of their region.




