- Selected to serve as primary adviser to the Director of the Office of Enforcement at the FERC. Full
 participant in management and personnel decisions affecting the 180 employees of the Office of
 Enforcement.
- Provided policy guidance on issues relating to all four Divisions of the Office Enforcement with particular focus on the Division of Investigations, the branch tasked with investigating and charging violations of the federal energy laws. Directly involved in all major prosecutorial choices including charging decisions, litigation strategy, and settlement in cases involving energy market manipulation, violations of the standards ensuring the reliability of the electric grid, and anticompetitive conduct in the energy markets.
- Led numerous initiatives to enhance the enforcement program including promulgating a Policy Statement on Penalty Guidelines, 130 FERC ¶ 61,220 (2010), to provide transparency to regulated entities on the mechanism for calculating civil penalties, a Policy Statement on Exculpatory Materials, 129 FERC ¶ 61,248 (2010), voluntarily adopting the requirements of *Brady v. Maryland* to apply in Commission enforcement actions, and announcing the prosecutorial priorities of the Office of Enforcement in the 2009 Staff Report on Enforcement.

Representative cases (served as lead or co-lead prosecutor on the following cases):

• <u>United States v. Santos</u>: Successfully tried to a guilty verdict on all counts a defendant indicted in a homicide-for-hire scheme where the defendant mistakenly killed the wrong people, including a fourteen-year-old boy. Advocated for and obtained a life sentence for the defendant.

- <u>United States v. Espinoza</u>: Successfully tried defendant accused of the transportation from Los Angeles to New York of 500 kilograms of cocaine, worth approximately \$10 million. The case involved the largest seizure of cocaine in Long Island history up to that point.
- <u>United States v. Albin</u>: Tried an associate member of the Genovese crime family accused of a large number
 of crimes relating to narcotics and RICO violations, including multiple incidents of violence. Defendant
 was acquitted at trial.
- <u>United States v. Rivera</u>: Investigated and indicted an eight-defendant international narcotics and kidnapping conspiracy case. Investigation involved obtaining judicial authorization for and monitoring multiple simultaneous wiretaps in both the United States and Colombia and travel to Colombia to coordinate with Colombian law enforcement. Extradited four defendants from Colombia to New York to stand trial. Case resulted in guilty pleas.
- <u>United States v. Jacobowitz</u>: Successfully obtained the convictions of the executives and primary managers of a publicly traded company indicted in a wide-ranging corporate fraud scheme including charges of bank fraud, insurance fraud, Sarbanes-Oxley violations, arson and bribery with total losses to investors and creditors of approximately \$160 million. The corporate misconduct led to the bankruptcy of one of the largest companies on Long Island, with over 300 employees and more than \$500 million in revenues.
