RECENT TEACHING EXPERIENCE

Sociocultural Perspectives (Kinesiology 164) San Jose State University (2015-2016) This course uses a sociological framework to study the sociocultural processes of sport and play in contemporary society. The study of phenomena arising out of group relations within sport and as it relates to the realm of kinesiology. Topics include transgender athletes and competition, gay athletes in male team sports, and female athlete pay equity.

History of Sport and Physical Education (Kinesiology 160) SJSU (2012-2016)

This historical survey of sports culture and physical education explores developments in mind/body relationships in various societies over time. Greek and Roman cultures are featured along with paramilitary training as a link to sports development across societies over to the 21st century. The development of sport, physical education and recreation in the U.S. is featured along with the global Olympic movement and international politics since 1896.

Sport in America (Kinesiology 101) SJSU (2012-2016)

This course deals with sport as a pervasive and politicized form of culture in the United States. Central to Sport in America are the ways in which sport shapes the identities of people across diverse social groups (race, ethnicity, class, gender, sexual orientation, age, and ability) within the context of larger social and cultural forces such as media, the NCAA and commercialism.

Corporate Entrepreneurship (Management 443) CSU, Chico (2010-2011)

As Morris, Kuratko & Covin (2008, p. iv) suggest, "Entrepreneurial attitudes and behaviors are necessary for firms of all sizes to prosper and flourish. The challenge to managers is one of creating an internal marketplace for ideas within their companies, and encouraging employees to act on these ideas." In exploring corporate entrepreneurship students are presented with various readings and case studies highlighting corporate dilemmas surrounding creativity, new products and employee development themes. I addition, group exercises challenge students to think creatively and local corporate entrepreneurs give present on how to thrive and innovate in both small and large companies.

Social Entrepreneurship (Management 453) CSU, Chico (2011)

As Elkington & Hartigan (2008, p. 4) note, social entrepreneurs "Develop and operate new ventures that prioritize social returns on investment. For example, they aim to improve the quality of life for marginalized populations in terms of poverty, health, or education and attempt to achieve higher leverage than conventional philanthropy and nongovernmental organizations." We explore who these social entrepreneurs are, where they operate, visit local sites of social entrepreneurship and work through our own proposals for social entrepreneurship initiatives. We will also learn from invited social entrepreneurs 1) what motivates them, 2) how they earn money, and 3) how they achieve "scalability" in their social ventures.

Managing Diversity & Change (Management 442) CSU, Chico (2010-2011)

This course centers on, as Michàlle Barak (2005, p. 222) suggests, "The voluntary organizational actions that are designed to create through deliberate policies and programs greater inclusion of employees from various backgrounds into the formal and informal organizational structures." Students explore academic scholarship, attend campus presentations on diversity and debate the pros and cons of the organizational inclusion of various social groups. Local speakers engage and challenge students to push beyond their assumptions and predispositions about gender, sexuality, ability and ethnicity.

PAST TEACHING EXPERIENCE

The Body in American Culture Canterbury (2002-2008)

This graduate-level seminar leads young scholars in guided research projects in the general area of U.S.A./New Zealand cross-cultural 1) race and ethnicity, 2) sport, or 3) hip-hop culture. Students get instruction on constructing annotated bibliographies, extended abstracts and essay outlining, writing rough drafts, and completing polished drafts of essays. In addition, we discuss appropriate research methodology, research designs and framing literature reviews for theses.

September 11th & the War on Terrorism Canterbury (2002-2008)

This team-taught course considers the events of 11 September 2001 and the ensuing War on Terrorism as well as the spectre of terrorism generally in American culture. We examine how competing American discourses comprehend the attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, the invasions of Afghanistan and Iraq and the War on Terrorism. We explore the cultural anxieties that surround terrorism in America, the consequences for American civil liberties of "homeland security," the role of "spectacle" in memorializing the attacks, the nature of American popular culture representations of both "Arabs" and "terrorists."

Contemporary African American Culture Canterbury (1997-2009)

This course focused on the contradiction between the 'American Creed' and the social reality for African Americans as voiced by the 'American Dilemma.' Texts include Frederick Douglass' *Slave Narrative*, Dubois' *Souls of Black Folks*, Derrick Bell's *Faces at the Bottom of the Well*, John Fiske's *Media Matters; Signifyin'*, *Sanctifying and Slam Dunkin'* by Gena Caponi, and the Special Edition of the *New Yorker* on African American Culture (April-May, 1996).

Hip-Hop Culture Canterbury (2002-2008)

The primary goal of the course is to review the roots of the hip-hop movement, its current concerns and its global trajectory. Rap and hip-hop music in the United States has brought to light the problems of inner-city African Americans and their continual battles with drug dependency, sub-standard educational systems, the perpetual welfare state, teen mothers, conspicuous consumption, black-on-black crime and black economic struggles.

Film & Contemporary African American Culture Canterbury (2004-2007)

This course is designed to introduce students to African American culture. The course content will focus on the development of African American culture as expressed by black film directors. How do African Americans express themselves in both public (interracial) and private (in-group) spaces? How has historical oppression in various institutions affected those ways of expressing everything from joy, happiness, and achievement to frustration, pain, anger and resentment?

Ethnicity and Identity Canterbury (1998-2001)

The course centered on a discussion of the problematic immigration of Asians and European ethnics to the United States. The European focus discusses the two major waves of immigration, first from Northern and Western Europe, and then the second – turn of the 20th Century – wave of Southern and Eastern immigrants. The focus is on Irish and Jewish immigrant issues, particularly. The Asian countries of focus are China, Japan and Korea. Also discussed are Vietnamese, Hmong & Filipino patterns of immigration. Key issues such as immigration law, cultural clashes, economic patterns and the convergence and divergence with the African American community are discussed.

The Sociology of Sport The University of California, Berkeley (2001)

Course centered on the convergent and divergent sporting experiences of racial and ethnic minorities, gays and lesbians and men and women in American sports institutions. Course also highlighted global sport issues in New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and England.

Race & Ethnicity The University of Wisconsin-Madison (1993 & 1994)

Course centered on the respective histories and contemporary issues of Native Americans, Asian Americans, Mexican Americans and African Americans.

Contemporary American Culture The University of Wisconsin-Madison (1994)

Course focused on 12 major issues confronting America in the 1990s including gays in the military, the legal drinking age, teen sexuality, and welfare and affirmative action programs.

Selling the American Dream: Brand USA© & the Global Marketplace Canterbury (07-08) In this team-taught course we critically examine the development of the American corporation, the rise of American consumer culture, the development of advertising and promotionalism in modern and postmodern contexts, the emergence of multinationals and the relationships between American cultural products and the complex flows of globalization. I interrogate commercialism in sport with emphasis on managing Tiger Woods' racial appeal and Nike advertising, in addition to marketing and brand management in hip-hop.

American Sports Culture Canterbury (2005-2008)

Over the past 100 years sporting traditions have developed in each code that are the source of contemporary challenges by traditionally excluded groups. These challenges and social debates quite often center on racial, cultural, gender, class and sexual issues. Various individuals are highlighted as exemplars of change, including Jesse Owens, Joe Louis, Jackie Robinson, Muhammad Ali, Chris Everett, Billy Jean King, Martina Navratilova, Greg Louganis, Terrell Owens, Venus Williams, Serena Williams and Tiger Woods.
